On our class page on the school website, I have put a PDF of the Year 5/6 High Frequency words. These are words that we should know by the end of Year 6.

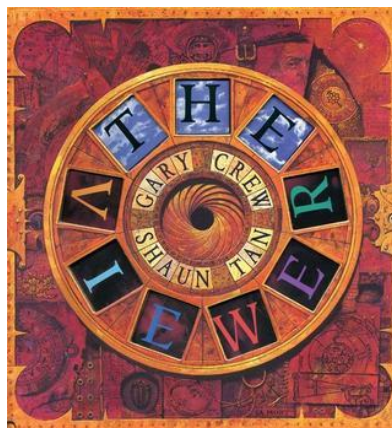

**Mon - Say, cover, write, check.**

**Tues - Make a glossary of the words.**

It is important that you know exactly what the words mean so that you can use them in your writing. Use this website [Thesaurus](#) and [Word Tools](#) | [WordHippo](#) select -meaning of- from the drop-down menu and create a glossary for each of your words.

**Wed - Use each word in a complex sentence.**

Now you know the meaning of all your words, use them in a complex sentence. Write a complex sentence for each word. Can you start each sentence differently and use a range of sentence starters?

## **History – The Anglo Saxons**

### **LO – To know how, when and where the Anglo-Saxons invaded Britain**

On our class page, is a PowerPoint all about how, when and where the Anglo-Saxons invaded Britain. It starts with the Romans having to leave Britain to protect their home country leaving the Britons in charge. The Picts and Scots were a constant threat to the Britons. Therefore, this lesson explored what the British King at the time (King Vortigern) did to protect his country and what the Anglo-Saxons did to invade Britain.
