To, Too and Two Homophones



Homophones

These words all sound the same, but they are spelt differently, and have different meanings.

to



to

'to' is a preposition when it comes before a noun.

The children are going <u>to</u> the shop. They went <u>to</u> London.



'**to**' is usually (but not always) used before the infinitive form of a verb. The infinitive form of a verb just means a verb in its most basic form.




I need to go <u>to</u> work today. I'm going <u>to</u> tidy the house tomorrow.

'**to**' has lots of meanings, but if 'too' and 'two' don't make sense, you probably need to use 'to'!

'too' can mean 'as well' and 'also'.

May I come shopping <u>too</u>? I like cakes, but I like biscuits <u>too</u>.



'too' can also be used to show excess.




I have eaten <u>too</u> much food. The bag was <u>too</u> heavy.

two

'two' means the number '2'.

There are <u>two</u> dogs running in the park.
