Pupil Premium 2018-2019

St Mary's

St Mary's Primary school seeks to provide a broad and balanced education built on Catholic values for all children by addressing their academic, social, moral and spiritual needs within a caring, positive and stimulating environment.

At St Mary's Primary School all members of staff and governors accept responsibility for all pupils recognising that pupils within the school population, some of whom are not eligible for Free School Meals, may at any point during their time at school may require additional support and intervention. We are committed to meeting their needs in a nurturing environment. As with every child in our care, a child who is entitled to Free School Meals, and therefore the Pupil Premium Grant, is valued, respected and entitled to develop to his/her full potential, irrespective of disadvantage.

Background of Pupil Premium

The Pupil premium is allocated to children from low-income families who are currently known to be eligible for Free School Meals and children who have been looked after continuously for more than six months. It is also used for pupils who have been on the FSM register but no longer qualify. Schools have the freedom to spend the Premium, which is additional to the schools budget, in a way they think will best support the raising of attainment for the most vulnerable pupils.

In order to meet the above requirements, the Governing Body and staff of St Mary's Primary School will ensure that provision is made which secures the teaching and learning opportunities that meet the needs of all pupils.

Pupil Premium Funding Allocation in 2018-2019

In 2018/2019 St Mary's will receive £15,840 for pupil premium children. This is how the money will be allocated:
